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# The School of Peace 2018 concludes; 17 received certificates

On November 28, 2018, sixteen participants who came to join the School of Peace 2018 in October received their certificates of completion. One participant who joined SoP by the end of October upon the recommendation of YMCA Yogyakarta received his certificate of participation. The symbolic giving of the certificates was done during the solidarity night and closing ceremony of SoP 2018 that was held at the chapel of Universitas Kristen Duta Wacana (UKDW).

Guests from the faculty UKDW and from

YMCA Yogyakarta came to celebrate with the participants. The Dean of UKDW Faculty of Theology, Dr. Paulus Sugeng Widjaja congratulated all SoP 2018 participants. 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# Shanti Nepal holds advocacy skills development training

Shanti Nepal held a three-day advocacy skills development activity on November 28-30, 2018 in Dang, Nepal, where its central office is located. There were 23 participants, 7 of them were women; 6 are an allmale School of Peace alumni, namely, Mohammad Ayatulla

Shreeram Chaudhary, chairperson of Shanti Nepal, initiated the program. He facilitated the sessions along with fellow SoP Alumni 2006. Bibek Shahi. To illustrate some points in structural analysis, Bibek used a bucket simulation game

where a bucket is placed in the front of three rows of participants. 10% of the participants were seated in the front row. 60% were seated in the second row and 30 % were seated in the third row. The bucket symbolized the society's leaders, power, and resources of the

government. Access to the bucket was signified by the candies - as symbol of requests - that are thrown into the bucket by the participants. Those few seated in the first row easily had their candies thrown into the bucket.

The ones seated in the second and third rows had difficulty throwing their candies into the bucket. Some made it; most of them did not make it because of their distance from the bucket. In society, the economic, social and political structures are not accessible to most of the 90% of the people. It is

also observable in Nepali families, where boys are given more access to education and health services. The girls usually are not given access and opportunities because of the idea that they will just become housewives and would live in their husbands' homes. This is gender discrimination.

Shreeram led the session on the art of

Shanti Nepal collaborates with Help Society Nepal, a local organization that works for issues such as right to food, education with multilingual curriculum development, livelihood,


gender justice and peace. The participants also had conversations with members of the Juntara Society Entrepreneur, a women's cooperative established in 2012 and led by Dila Kumari KC. One member named Dhana Basnet, a married woman, shared that before being involved in the cooperative, she was so shy to go outside of

her home and engage with other people. When she became a cooperative member, she feels free and empowered to engage with the community. Dhana said: "Everyone has skills but the problem is we did not find and recognized ourselves, what [potentials] we have inside us."

Now, this women's cooperative have 104 members.

The participants also visited the Gyan Jyoti Elementary School where most of the students come from the Dalit community and areas affected by armed conflict. Help Society Nepal also gives technical support to this school. Today, this school has become one of

the modern schools around Dang district.

The three-day program concluded with the visit to the famous place in Shre Pandaveshwor Mahadev Temple in Dang Ghorahi where the tallest Trishul (trident of Lord Shiva) around the Asia is located. The participants

observer. Setya Rkj and husband Roni came to provide the batik outfits. Muriel Orevillo-Montenegro prepared the singers through vocalization and making sure the singers hit the right notes. YMCA Indonesia NGS Retha Andoea also gave her support by helping Tanya of Thailand do the makeup both for the women and men.

To make the recording process shorter, the crew decided to divide

the group into two, instead of doing a single recording for each of the 17 participants. Thus, the first group of six participants – Rani, Tanya, Hosea, Kwang, Thura and Kyaw - was tasked to record as individually for the first round of the song. The second group was tasked to sing the second round of the song. They recorded the song separately. The voice and video entailed too many takes, so that

the whole process took six hours. This was because all the participants were neophytes to record production.

ICF is grateful to Rev. Susanto, ICC and IGNITE for giving this opportunity to the participants of SoP 2018. IGNITE hopes to release the record and publish it in IGNITE youtube in January 2019.

#### From the ICF Coordinator's Desk: A Christmas Reflection

monopoly of Christianity. Some Asian religions also believe in the revelation of the divine in an embodied, this-worldly form, usually human but also in non-human forms. In Hindu tradition, an avatara is the incarnation of a deity. The Bhagavad Gita tells us that Krishna is the 9th incarnation of Vishnu, the "all pervasive one." Krishna became human to teach and enable believers to see the path to liberation.
Through incarnation, Christians believe that the nature and will of the Divine becomes "recognizable and intelligible to humans." Philosopher G.W.F. Hegel theorized

that humanity may incarnate the divine Absolute or the Spirit. In this sense, we, human beings can embody the christic nature and make the world a better place to live for every being. Believers need, therefore, to understand that incarnation is the continuous flow of the

relationship between God and human beings, between God and other created beings on this Earth.

The Interfaith Cooperation Forum is a program of Asia and Pacific Alliance of YMCAs. It values the significance of interreligious understanding and unity. Thus, it offers opportunities for study and appreciation of the different perspective of religions on peace, and discern the role of religion in peacebuilding. Yet, considering that unpeace is brought about by many factors, including the onslaught of neoliberal economic globalization, more people experience poverty, internally displaced people are increasing as communities are destroyed, native wisdom and values are overrun by Western and consumerist outlooks, patriarchy and racism persists, and climate change is now felt as the destruction of the Planet Earth seems unabated.

Peace is celebrated as a gift from the Divine, yet, we, the earthlings have the responsibility to make peace a reality. Although its contribution may just be like a drop of water into the lake, ICF seeks to equip young people of different religious traditions, especially from the marginalized communities of Asia and Pacific, to make waves of peacebuilding actions.

#### From the ICF Coordinator's Desk: A Christmas Reflection

As a young college student, I delved into my feelings of sadness when Christmas comes. After college, I worked people in the slum areas. I saw the suffering of many innocent children in this world. It dawned upon me that the melancholic feeling I have had every Christmas had some connection to Rachel's lament (Matt. 2:18). Herod ordered the killing of the children of Bethlehem. The story echoes the lamentation of the Babylonian exiles (Jeremiah 31:15) who regarded Rachel as symbol of all Israelite mothers. Mothers wept when their children were held in Ramah, from where the exiles were deported to Baby-Ion. Rachel, the beloved wife of lacob (Gen. 32:22-30) and mother of Joseph, died when she gave birth to Benjamin, and was buried in Beth-

lehem. I realized that my feeling is somehow connected to the other end of the Christmas story — the crucifixion of lesus of Nazareth.

Incarnation is the Christian doctrine that articulates the belief that God became flesh in Jesus of Nazareth, the Christ. In a paper written for an academic journal, I argued that the doctrine needs rethinking not only because it conveys androcentric concepts that privilege men and marginalize women, but that it has also provided a romanticized justification for the violence of the cross. It discriminates the female body and sexuality by associating it with sin. Consequently, it removes Mary from her femaleness and humanity, and makes maleness ontologically necessary for incarnation. The traditional doctrine of incarnation is exclusivist and privileges the

story of only one people from the Mediterranean basin.

Yet, God is incarnate in many ways. Asian feminist theologians have dismantled the grand narratives of Christianity that fixes God's revelation in Jesus. While Jesus is recognized as the epiphany of God in Christian tradition, he may not be the sole embodiment of God's revelation. Incarnation is not even limited to a human figure.

Women also experience God as Christ embodied in other ecological forms. The idea of incarnation is not a
